BWSC Lanka was established in 1999, as a Sri Lanka based subsidiary of Burmeister & Wain Scandinavian Contractor A/S (BWSC). BWSC is a Danish power plant developer, turnkey and operation contractor owned fully by Japanese Mitsui Engineering and Shipbuilding Ltd. (MES).

BWSC takes a leading role in development of Private Power Projects. In every project, BWSC is a leading team player offering perspectives and optimal solutions on issues, which incorporates all aspects from construction to operation of diesel power plants. This proves invaluable already at the development stage, when efforts are directed at identifying the optimal project concept based on realistic life cycle costs and performance projections. During the project lifecycle, the client can rely on BWSC to bring the power plant from concept to reality - to operation on time and within budget as demonstrated from a proven track record.

Power Projects in Sri Lanka



In 1999, BWSC Lanka entered into a 15-year contract with Colombo Power (Private) Ltd. covering the entire commitment for the operation and maintenance of the 60 MW Colombo Power Barge, situated in Colombo Harbour. Transfer of technology and know-how to Sri Lankans is essential in the BWSC business approach. Therefore, BWSC Lanka has employed and trained more than 50 skilled local engineers and technicians, and they have secured an impressive performance resulting in a Plant Load Factor in 2001 above 96%.

The power barge was supplied by MES as a turnkey contract with BWSC as sub-contractor for the complete electrical equipment supply, overall testing, and commissioning of the entire barge.



The Sapugaskanda Power Station project for Asia Power (Private) Limited (APPL) was developed as the first private venture Build, Own, and Operate Project and implemented in 1997/98 as an ultra fast track project in record time by a Consortium of BWSC and Deutz UK Ltd. as sponsors, shareholders, and contractors. Other investors in APPL include among others John Keells Holdings Ltd. and "Industrialiseringsfonden for Udviklingslandene" (IFU) of Denmark. Operation and maintenance of the plant is undertaken fully by the

Sri Lanka based APOM, a company employing more than 55 local people.

The Colombo Power Barge and the Sapugaskanda BOO Power Station are two of Sri Lanka's local independent power generation facilities. They have covered 14% of the total supply of electricity in Sri Lanka in 2001.

BWSC Lanka has a keen interest in utilising its skills, resources, and profound knowledge in the further development of Sri Lanka's power generation business in close co-operation with the Government and all their Agencies, especially the Ceylon Electricity Board, the Ceylon Petroleum Corporation, and the Board of Investment.



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
